What do I need to know about the retail market?

The following summary statistics have been taken from market research reports and reliable resources that the Information Service uses to compile industry information. They should give you an indication of how your industry is faring at present and whether there is demand for your type of business:

- ♦ The steady improvement in consumer confidence seen in the second half of 2023 has stalled in 2024. As of May 2024, **31% of consumers said their financial situation had improved year-on-year, but 30% said it had worsened,** with the majority saying it was about the same. However there is significant polarisation between higher and lower-income households in the level of improvement. (Mintel, *UK Retail Trends − Summer − UK -* 2024)
- Online sales grew by 5.3% in 2023 and are forecast to grow by 3.5% in 2024. Although inflation has eased, many shoppers remain strapped for cash. The value credentials of the online channel will keep the channel relevant, but the challenge is to retain shoppers whose confidence is improving, by finding new ways to offer value. All has the potential to transform online retailing in the next few years and, indeed, is already doing so. While there is some wariness among the general population about sharing personal data with All tools, nearly a quarter (24%) of online shoppers have used an All tool to find product inspiration, rising to 50% of Younger Millennials. (Mintel, State of Retail: Online Retailing UK 2024).
- ♦ 80% of consumers are members of a customer loyalty/reward scheme, and 87% of members believe that loyalty/reward schemes save them money. Usage and membership of schemes have naturally grown during the cost of living crisis, and the value they offer shoppers has been reinforced by most leading schemes now adopting some form of membership pricing, tapping into the demand for more instant gratification in rewards from such schemes. (Mintel, Customer Loyalty in Retailing UK 2024).
- ▶ In 2023-24 (102.6 points), the retail sales index is forecast to rise by a 2.3%. Reflecting a projected economic recovery and a slight easing of the aforementioned macroeconomic headwinds including surging inflation partially caused by the Ukraine-Russia fuelled energy and supply chain crisis which exceeded wage growth, demand across the UK retail sector is expected to recover. However, retail is not without its problems over the current year, as the BoE has consistently hiked rates to combat stubborn inflation (IBISWorld UK, Retail Sales Index, July 2023).

The national organisation for this industry is <u>The British Retail Consortium</u> and <u>The Scottish Retail</u>
<u>Consortium</u>. Other industry bodies include the <u>British Independent Retailers Association</u>, <u>Association of Convenience Stores</u> and <u>IMRG</u> (Interactive Media in Retail Group).

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How can I find out about my competitors?

Business Gateway's online guide to <u>Competitor Analysis</u> explains how to find your competitors, how to research what they're doing and how to act on what you learn about them.

Immediate competition will be from other businesses in your local area. There are several online directories which can be used to find company information and generate lists easily and at no expense. Many Local Authorities also publish local business directories on the web. Below are some key web resources:

- General business directories such as <u>Yell</u>, <u>Thomson Local</u> or <u>Google Maps</u>
- Trade specialists like <u>EuroPages</u> (European directory), <u>The Wholesaler</u> or <u>Free Index</u>
- Business to business (B2B) specialists such as <u>Kompass</u>

Likewise, your local Chamber of Commerce may publish a members' directory; find your local Chamber on the Scottish Chambers website.

Once you've identified who your competitors are, the next step is to gather information on the way they do business. Which services do they provide? How do they market themselves? How much do they charge?

To learn about your competitors:

- Look for articles or adverts in local newspapers, trade press and directories.
- Try to read their marketing material; if the company has an online presence, visit the company's website as a first port of call. Not only does it give you a better understanding of the company's activities, it can also offer a wealth of information such as a company history or staff biographies, as well as the company's partners or suppliers
- Search for information on limited UK companies via the <u>Companies House</u> website
- Gain an insight into your competitor's performance using credit checks and the accounts that limited companies are required to submit to Companies House each year.

- ♦ Access the latest population estimates from the <u>National Records of Scotland (NRS)</u>. NRS also offers demographic factsheets for each council area in Scotland, which can provide summary statistics for the area you will be based in.
- ♦ Information from the most recent census in 2011 is released via the official website. See in particular the Census Area Profiles. Clicking on your area of interest will give the latest population figures, including estimates by age.
- ♦ <u>Understanding Scottish Places</u> has interactive profiles of towns and cities across Scotland. It can be useful for understanding the interrelationships and flows between towns, and also gives comparisons between two or more places.
- <u>Scottish Government Statistics</u> provide accurate and up-to-date statistics on Scotland, covering population, health, education and housing.
- ◆ <u>The Scottish Household Survey</u> provides information on the structure, characteristics, attitudes and behaviour of Scottish households, both at a national and local level.
- Office for National Statistics (ONS) is the recognised national statistical body for the UK. ONS covers a
 wide range of demographic, economic and social issues at a UK level.
